
#### **Second Annual Alumni Basketball Games**

#### I understand it—A Teacher's Musings...

I understand why this school has such a high turnover rate. I have been disrespected more in the 3 months since school started than I have in my whole life prior. I've been yelled at. I've been cussed at. I've been called a racist because I told a student of a different ethnicity than my own to put away his phone while I was teaching. I've been told "give me my points" after a student did a depthless and incomplete assignment, as if I was supposed to praise them for doing 1/3 of the work assigned. I've had students get angry and walk out of my class because I challenged them to actually put pen to paper. I've broken up fights. I've almost had a student take a swing at me because I stepped in to keep them from hurting each other while fighting. I've had parents complain that I'm not doing enough to help their student that refuses to do anything in my class, even when I stand at their desk, prompt-



ing, rephrasing, and all-but writing things down for them. I've had parents request that I call them from my home at 9pm to help their child study for a test the next day.

I've seen co-workers berated by adults and hated by students because they desperately want to see kids grasp their content. I've seen students disrespect principals and administration.

I've heard students brag about having a teacher quit mid-year every year they've been in school. I've seen students quit on themselves. I've seen students encourage others to quit on themselves too. **So I understand it... I understand** why I'm the 4th teacher to be in this classroom in 3 years. I understand the allure of walking away and never coming back. I can honestly say the thought has passed through my head a few times.

#### But I also understand something else...

I understand the need for consistency, the need to have someone believe in you. I understand that when a student disrespects me in my classroom, it could be because they are disrespected in their home. I understand that when a student talks about how excited they are for graduation, it could be because they never thought they would make it there, and no one else did either. I understand that having someone push you is uncomfortable, and that life is hard. But I also understand the feeling of understanding something you never thought you would.

I understand the thrill of finishing a task I had thought would be impossible. I understand how it feels to have someone love me and believe in me, even when I don't believe in myself... And I know what that means for me.

I know that because students don't believe in themselves, I have to believe for them. I know that because students are so ready to quit on themselves, I have to refuse to let them. I know that because I am different than they are, they expect me to disrespect them, so I can never show them anything but love. I know that I need to be the one celebrating graduation with my students that are so unsure about the adults in their life that they use "if" when talking about me being here by the end of the year...And I know there is no way I can quit.

Because I can't be another adult that has said they care and then walks away when it gets difficult. Because life is a difficult course, that doesn't come easily to many. Because I am their teacher. They have things they need to learn from me, and I have so much more than just my content to teach them. *Anonymous*
